

Women are a key aspect of the agriculture industry and are responsible for many facets on the farm. This program is geared towards women and the many hats they wear in the agriculture industry. Topics for the day centered around exploring diversified revenue streams, such as agritourism and locally grown product marketing. I'm a Farmer, Too is a

joint effort put on by the three regional agriculture educators. Speakers included the regional agriculture educators and Stephanie Plaster, Statewide Agriculture Business Development Outreach Specialist. Comments from the day about things participants learned include: all the resources through Extension that I wasn't aware of before, how to do a SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis, partnerships available through Extension, and new crop information.





Crops & Soils



Jordyn Sattler - Regional Crops & Soils Educator

Grant, Green, Iowa & Lafayette Counties

The University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension Crops and Soils program translates cutting-edge research into accessible and relevant resources for farmers; identifies hurdles to implementing new practices, including agronomic, social or cultural barriers; and engages trusted community leaders to disseminate research findings and messages to all Wisconsin farmers.

Insect Pest Trapping Network

Southern Wisconsin is often one of the first areas of the state that experiences pest pressure from migratory insects, but has lacked timely monitoring which results in delayed awareness of damaging pests and potential economic crop loss. To begin building the insect pest trapping network in the Southwest region of the state, Jordyn worked with DATCP to set up a site with two pheromone traps targeting specific migratory pests. This provided local data to producers and alerted them to potential pest threats in their area. The information and experience gathered in the 2025 season will be used to further promote the insect pest trapping network throughout the area and develop training materials for new collaborators joining the network.



Nitrogen Work

Nitrate leaching into groundwater is a concern for residents, landowners, and farmers alike. To address these concerns, several projects and events were done to collect local on-farm data and share information about efficient nitrogen use, agronomic vs economic optimum nitrogen rates, the effect of adding cover crops, environmental impacts of excess nitrogen in agronomic systems, and nitrogen-focused biological products. Through these programs, participants have been given the tools to evaluate nitrogen use on their farms and will be better equipped to make management changes that improve farm economics and protect groundwater resources..



Pesticide Applicator Training

Under both federal and state laws, certain pesticide applicators must be “certified” before they can legally use and apply pesticides. The certification process often includes training and requires applicators to pass an exam to prove they know how to use restricted use pesticides properly, safely, and legally. Private applicators (not for-hire) can complete their training and take their exam here locally in the Green County Extension office. Training is offered annually, and testing can be scheduled at any time.



Dairy



Jackie McCarville - Regional Dairy Educator

Grant, Green, Iowa & Lafayette Counties

The University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension Dairy Program strengthens the competitiveness of the Wisconsin dairy industry through programs in education and research based to improve animal welfare, breeding and genetics selection, automation and modernization, and nutritional decisions for producers, dairy workers, managers, and agricultural professionals.

Badger Dairy Insight

Badger Dairy Insight is a monthly webinar that Jackie leads the effort on for the dairy educators that provides the latest research-based dairy information to improve animal welfare, breeding and genetic selection, automation and modernization, and nutritional decisions for producers, dairy workers and managers, ag professionals and educators. Our March topic was "Higher Fertility Success with Wisconsin Dairy Farmers" and was moderated by Dr. Paul Fricke. Green County dairy farmer, Jeff McNeely of Rollin' Green Dairy Farm, was one of speakers on our producer panel. Save a Calf, Save a Cow

Held in partnership with Zoetis and the livestock educator in Crawford, LaCrosse, Richland, and Vernon counties, this workshop was held both by Zoom and in-person and offered in English and Spanish. The workshop provided information and techniques to boost the confidence of farmers and employees in preparing the cow for calving, obstetric techniques and newborn calf care. It also included transition cow diets and body condition to recognizing key signs of labor and handling difficult deliveries with precision along with colostrum management. Jackie helped create and presented the transition cow diet information where 53% of attendees increased their knowledge. The event was held in Darlington and Gays Mills. One attendee said, "loved the model; having a hands-on opportunity really puts it all together and I feel prepared to actually try it in real situations."





Livestock



Kim Kester - Regional Livestock Educator

Grant, Green, Iowa & Lafayette Counties

The University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension Livestock Program provides timely resources and information to help farmers, consumers and allied industry to make informed decisions about beef cattle, poultry, sheep and goats, equine, swine, and meat science. There are also resources for youth caring for livestock.

Helping Beef Producers Establish S.M.A.R.T. Goals for their Farms

Kim created and delivered presentations about developing S.M.A.R.T. goals for beef cattle producers in the WI School for Beginning Beef Production webinars and Western WI Beef Producers annual meeting. S.M.A.R.T. goals are Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Time-based. Many of the 57 participants stated they were not familiar with S.M.A.R.T.-style goals and thought it would improve their

operation by adding specificity and actionability to their herd performance goals. Kim also co-authored an article for Wisconsin Cattlemen's Association's "Cattle Trails" newsletter about setting goals, keeping quality records, and analyzing production records. The newsletter was distributed to over 1,300 beef producers in Green County and beyond at Equity sale barns, mailboxes, and e-mail inboxes.



Poultry Product Education for Small-Scale Producers and Consumers

During Food for America at Spring Grove Dairy in October, Kim spent a day teaching over 450 adults and youth in 22 presentations about the Wisconsin poultry industry and how eggs make the journey from farm to grocery store. She focused on biological processes of the chicken, food safety and quality in the supply chain, and how consumers can be confident they are buying a wholesome food product.

Participants saw table eggs be candled to evaluate egg quality and shell defects. Teachers and FFA members commented that they enjoyed the poultry presentation. Kim also wrote a poultry article for UW-Madison's Livestock program website about how much meat small-scale poultry producers and consumers can expect from different species of birds, as well as proportions of each cut of meat. This guide will assist in budgeting for producers who raise meat birds for direct-to-consumer sales, plus give buyers an idea of how much meat they will receive.





Community Development



Victoria Solomon – Community Development Educator

Solomon gives Green County access to university research and knowledge in:

- **Community Leadership Development** – Educational programming to develop community leadership, civic engagement, and deliberative dialogue.
- **Local Government**– Providing educational opportunities for local government officials and staff.
- **Economic Development** – Enhancing local economic health.

Green County Community Engagement on Renewable Energy Siting

Under a Department of Energy grant, Extension is working with Green County as the first of three pilot communities to have community conversations regarding perspectives on large scale renewable energy siting. Solomon recruited a Green County advisory team with a range of relevant expertise. The project team conducted preliminary focus groups and interviews around renewable energy concerns and priorities. Over 70 county residents, including farmers, landowners, and local government officials, attended two community conversations. Their input is compiled into a report and presented to the advisory committee and county board.



Advancing Entrepreneurship: Legal Essentials for Start-Ups in Green County

The Legal Essentials for Start-Ups in Green County provided education for entrepreneurs in Green County. This was an opportunity for Green County community members to learn from Attorney Jeff Glazer from the UW Law and Entrepreneurship Clinic about essential legal knowledge for running businesses and managing risk. Nine adult participants attended the bilingual (English/Spanish) session. This session was possible through a partnership with UW-Madison Division of Extension, the UW-Madison Law and Entrepreneurship Clinic, The Bank of New Glarus, Dando Una Mano Together We Rise, Green County Development Corporation, and the UW-Madison Rural Entrepreneurship Venture.




Local Government: Green County Board & County Admin Forum

The Green County Board Strategic Planning Committee adopted a recommendation transitioning from a County Clerk–Administrative Coordinator to a full-time County Administrator. Before a County Board meeting, UW-Madison Extension's Local Government Education Program and Extension Green County, in partnership with the Wisconsin Counties Association, hosted a community forum to explain the implications. Board members asked questions and left better informed to consider the recommendation.



Green County Leaders

Green County Leaders (GCL) is an educational program where individuals practice leadership skills, deepen their understanding of community issues, and network with leaders in Green County. The 2024-2025 GCL class had 32 participants. The class had six community projects: Green County Happy Paws Pathway, Green County Smiles, Greener Monroe, Impact Green County, New Glarus Dog Park, and Temporary Animal Care Network.



4-H Exploration Day Grows Bigger & Better

Green County 4-H provides opportunities for youth to explore a variety of interest areas through hands-on workshops that engage youth in new and meaningful learning. For the second year in a row, Andrews partnered with Blackhawk Technical College and their instructors, along with 4-H volunteers and Extension Educators, to offer a 4-H Exploration Day at the Monroe college campus. The event offered 22 different session topics spread over three different morning periods and was open to any youth in 3rd grade and older. We had 81 youth register for this program, which was a 260% increase in participants. This opportunity was made possible thanks to the 11 adults and 6 older youth that volunteered to teach sessions. As a presenter expressed, "This is a good way for members to try out a topic and see if it matches their interests. It's also a good way for leaders to reach members that may be in clubs that do not have a leader in a particular project."



Expanded Partnerships Open Doors to 4-H Membership

In 2025, 4-H Youth Development Educator, Ellen Andrews, partnered with Green County YMCA and the Monroe Park and Recreation program to expand our Summer 4-H Club program model to provide more youth the opportunity to join the Green County 4-H program. Through Summer 4-H club meetings, youth experienced a variety of interest areas and participated in hands-on learning activities. While these clubs run only during the summer, youth in the clubs are full 4-H members and have many of the same opportunities to participate in 4-H as year-long members. The youth in both the YMCA and Park and Rec programs exhibited at county fair, could attend 4-H camp, and experience the growth opportunities provided by the 4-H program.



4-H in the Great Outdoors

The Green County 4-H Junior & Adult Leaders Executive Board, with educational support from the 4-H Educator, set a goal at the beginning of the year to create a new educational event. "4-H in the Great Outdoors" was a free event, held at Cadiz Spring State Recreation Area. Youth and adult leaders collaborated to offer seven different hands-on outdoor learning stations, as a method of exploring a variety of nature related interest areas, including kayaking, fishing, fire building, wildlife and plant identification and paracord bracelet making.



Volunteer Development and Support

Volunteers play a critical role in the delivery of quality educational 4-H programs. Training is one way that 4-H insures volunteers are prepared to provide a safe, engaging place for youth to learn and grow. Starting with the 2024-2025 4-H program year, the Green County 4-H Educator, Ellen Andrews, started requiring a meeting with each new 4-H adult volunteer, where volunteers discuss their interest in being volunteers, review volunteer expectations and are connected with role specific resources. Through this effort, Andrews ensures she has established a relationship and line of communication with each volunteer, for whom she oversees.



Supporting Healthy Relationships

Strong communities begin with strong families. Healthy relationships are the foundation of well-being for both children and adults. Families do not exist in isolation—they are shaped by the people, institutions, social norms, and policies around them. Through research-based programs and resources, Extension provides the knowledge and support families need to thrive. To ensure a vibrant and successful county in 2045, we must invest in building resilient families today.

Financial Education Programs

Only 37% of Americans have completed Advance Care Directives, despite their importance. Planning AHEAD addresses this gap by covering topics such as financial changes, estate planning, advance directives, end-of-life care, and grief. This program is especially valuable for individuals who have recently lost a spouse or partner and are adjusting to new responsibilities. It also benefits communities by reducing reliance on public assistance among older adults living alone.

In 2025, Planning AHEAD was offered at the Green County Extension Office, Albertson Memorial Library in Albany, Blanchardville Public Library, and online, with 20 Green County residents participating. Additionally, Financial Coaching was introduced for the first time at the Green County Jail, where 13 individuals improved their financial knowledge in preparation for re-entry into society.

Planning AHEAD—Green County Fall 2025

End of life planning can be an intimidating, confusing, and emotional process. In a 2019 needs assessment, Extension educators throughout Wisconsin indicated a need for educational programs targeted to older adults who are about to or have lost a spouse or partner. Proactive planning for end-of-life decisions and care can prevent associated financial and emotional burdens. In response to this need, Extension developed a comprehensive end-of-life program called Planning AHEAD. The Planning AHEAD curriculum covers seven topics: Getting Started, Handling Financial Changes, Advance Directives, Estate Planning, Choices in End-of-Life Care, Final Wishes, and Understanding Grief. The course is typically delivered in weekly hour-long sessions for seven weeks. A participant said “Appreciated the time and expertise devoted to helping traverse the journey to ‘Plan Ahead.’” This class had 10 participants.

Financial Coaching—Green County Jail

Extension's financial coaching program provides one-on-one support that helps residents create their own plans to manage expenses, pay off debts, save money for emergencies and to reach their goals. Participants can meet with Extension educators trained to provide coaching as many times as needed to develop and implement plans to resolve their financial challenges. The three main outcome goals are that participants will learn about local resources (e.g. how to apply for FoodShare benefits), Extension resources (e.g. spending plan worksheets), and financial management steps (e.g. steps to improve their credit). In 2024, Wisconsin residents who received our financial coaching reported many positive changes, suggesting that they can now more successfully navigate financial services. These positive outcomes extend beyond the coaching clients themselves, with clients reporting that a total of 449 family members also benefited from them. Wiegel has worked with 9 participants so far, one stating, “That was more constructive than I expected.”

Poverty Simulation for SSM Leaders

On November 5, Extension facilitated a Poverty Simulation for SSM Health leaders in Monroe. Wiegel led the simulation with support from Bev Doll, Human Development and Relationships Educator in Grant County, along with assistance from Area 17 Extension team members, including Andrews, McCarville, Roth, Sattler, Solomon, and AED Perkins. The event engaged 36 participants in a simulated month in the life of individuals and families living in poverty. Participants navigated real-world challenges and systemic barriers, gaining insight into associated complexities and frustrations. The program was highly successful, and SSM expressed deep appreciation for Extension's efforts in planning and delivering this impactful learning experience.





FoodWise

For over 30 years UW–Madison Extension has been providing local nutrition education throughout Wisconsin. The program “FoodWise” has been funded by the federal SNAP–Ed grant program. Our FoodWise Educators have been a cornerstone of Extension’s mission to improve the health and well-being of Wisconsin residents, providing nutrition education and community-based strategies to support healthy eating and active lifestyles.

In 2025 Green County FoodWise program staff, Maggie Milcarek and Julia Harman partnered with Juda and Albrecht Elementary Schools, Family Promise of Green County, ADRC, Monroe Housing Authority, Emergency Shelters, Adult Day Centers, and area Food Pantries to engage children, families, and seniors on topics of nutrition education.

Despite extensive efforts by Extension, UW–Madison’s University Relations, and partners such as the Wisconsin Counties Association, the congressional budget reconciliation bill signed into law on July 4, 2025 eliminated all National Education and Obesity Prevention Grant Program (SNAP–Ed) funding effective September 30, 2025. As a result, the FoodWise program was ended in Green County and throughout Wisconsin.

FoodWise has always been about more than just nutrition education. It’s about empowering communities to thrive. We know that SNAP–Ed funded programs made Wisconsin healthier. We are proud of the work we have done serving the Green County Community and the lives we have changed for the better.
